- 5** "UU Independents" - As members of a progressive faith, how can we best celebrate patriotism and promote liberty? This service will feature thoughts on this subject from UU thinkers and activists, as we honor our legacy of dissent and resistance, as well as hope for the future of patriotism.
- 12** "Serenity" - with Rev. Bonnie Devlin. The "Serenity Prayer" is read and spoken by millions of people every day as a means to gain perspective and balance in living life on life's terms. Its short version is more spiritual and interfaith in nature, lending itself to be a short prayer, mantra or affirmation. The longer version of this prayer is more Christian in origins, more theologically demanding. Both versions are full of wisdom, and deserving of reflection, since serenity is one of the greatest gifts we can seek and have in life.
- 19** Jeff Nall: His topic is the major theme of his new book: *Perpetual Revolt: Essays on Peace & Justice and The Shared Values of Secular, Spiritual, and Religious Progressives* (Howling Dog Press). Nall will discuss the necessity for citizens to be persistently and fearlessly engaged in the peace and justice struggle despite the change in leadership in Washington and the sometimes-dismal prospects for peace. He will discuss recent national and statewide protests, and the so-called "Obama effect." After the talk, Nall will sign copies of his book and offer event-goers a comprehensive directory of statewide peace/anti-war groups and organizers.
- 26** "Adventures of a Hindu UU" - Rev. Manish K. Mishra, Senior Minister at the Unitarian Universalist Church of St. Petersburg, Florida, leads our service this morning sharing his experience of coming into Unitarian Universalism as someone from the Hindu faith. How might those of us who did not grow up UU bring our religion of origin with us into UU'ism? How might Unitarian Universalism help us understand other faiths? How are each of us religious explorers? Join us as Rev. Mishra explores these and other questions.

June 17, 2009 Meeting

The Board of Trustees took the following action:

The Board approved having an official Myspace page - www.myspace.com/UUCL

It was proposed that UUCL become a "Green Sanctuary" as a congregational goal. This will be discussed in more detail at the Board retreat, the Council workday to be held on July 11th, and the July Board meeting.

The replacement of the RE porch was discussed. The Board has received a quote from a contractor to replace the RE porch. This is being held in abeyance until we receive more information. The Board authorized Peter Helwig to contact the City of Lakeland to find out about the permitting process. The Board also authorized Lester Kline to prepare a preliminary drawing.

UUCL still needs a Cluster representative and a District representative

The contract for next year with Rev. Bonnie Devlin will begin in September. The Worship Committee will be working closely with Rev. Bonnie on all Sunday services.

The employment contract for the Religious Exploration Coordinator, Heather Curry, will begin in July 2009 through June 2010.

The Board directed the General Assembly delegates to cast one vote for Hallman and one vote for Morales.

The spaghetti dinner fundraiser netted \$190 to help President Linda Walters defray expenses to General Assembly.

The Board received one quote to tent the kitchen/office building for wood termites. The Board asked that we get a quote for foam treatment instead of tenting.

The "name the Beacon" newsletter was tabled until the July Board meeting.

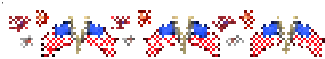

Summertime at UUCL is a period of stark contrasts. Empty chairs at Sunday services, where our snowbirds and vacationing members normally sit, belie the activity humming all week "behind the scenes" on the Congregation's campus.

As ever, Portia Westerfield and Linda Walters continue bringing you this newsletter on a monthly basis, while our Worship committee, under chair Tracie Welser, meets faithfully to plan Sunday services. Our Hospitality sub-committee, led by the tireless Jean and Bill Lord, still provides coffee and goodies at services and events. The talented Glenn Welser continues updating and improving our congregation's website, and the Common Grounds Coffee House, founded and organized by Daniel Whitt, keeps perking, offering periodic live performances of music and poetry. These are only a few of the regular activities that continue during a deceptively calm summer at UUCL. A series of special events is also underway to mark the start of the new church year on July 1. Already, the 2009-2010 Board of Trustees has held a retreat to set goals and codify its commitment to the Congregation. Past President Linda Walters and Treasurer Joyce Bode have traveled to Salt Lake City to represent UUCL at our denomination's General Assembly, where they voted for a new UUA president and conducted other church business. On July 11, the Committee Council, under the leadership of President-Elect Theresa Lutz, will hold a workday to coordinate its activities for the coming year, and our Consulting Minister, Rev. Bonnie Devlin, is hard at work planning services and a leadership retreat for the fall. Several members and friends - including Heather Curry, Judi Irwin, and Lester Kline - are working on replacing the porch on our RE complex. And Faye Moore and Jane Eskenazi have agreed to reorganize our Congregational Library in the Quiet Room, to make it a peaceful and attractive place for members and visitors to find information and reflect in sacred silence.

UUA President's Statement in Support of Bisexual, Gay, Lesbian, and Transgender People

June 18, 2009

Rev. William G. Sinkford, President of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), released the following statement today.

The bisexual, gay, lesbian, and transgender (BGLT) community and their allies have been watching for a signal from the Obama administration that promises made during the campaign about BGLT rights would soon become realities. While there are some signs of hope in the recent decision to extend partial benefits to same-sex partners of federal employees, the promises of the Obama campaign remain largely unfulfilled.

Rev. Louise Green, Minister of Social Justice at Washington, DC's, All Souls Church, Unitarian, said this yesterday: "President Obama and Congress have a long way to go to fully address the exclusion, oppression and violence that the (gay and lesbian) community faces every day ... In order to ensure that today's action is just a first step and not a last, my fellow people of faith must continue raising our collective voice in support of true equality. We must be clear: we stand on the side of love, and everyone, our nation's leaders especially, are welcome to join us."

As I prepare to leave office as president of the Unitarian Universalist Association, I assure you that Unitarian Universalists will continue to advocate for full rights for bisexual, gay, lesbian, and transgender people.

Unitarian Universalist Association President Applauds New Hampshire Marriage Law

June 3, 2009

Rev. William G. Sinkford, President of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), issued this statement in support of New Hampshire's new marriage law.

I am overjoyed that New Hampshire has joined the growing number of states with inclusive marriage laws. This is another victory for civil rights in America. More and more fair-minded citizens believe that same-sex couples and their families deserve legal recognition and protection, and that conviction is cause for joy and celebration.

As a religious leader who has proudly officiated at weddings for same-sex couples, I am called to set the record straight: In more than two centuries of changing state and federal marriage statutes, no religious group or official has ever been required to solemnize a marriage that goes against the teachings of their faith, nor will new marriage laws require them to do so in the future. Marriage equality is a matter of civil rights, not sacred rites.

Rev. Peter Morales Elected as Eighth President of UUA

June 27, 2009

Rev. Peter Morales, senior minister of Jefferson Unitarian Church in Golden, CO, was elected today to be the eighth president of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations at the Association's General Assembly in Salt Lake City.

Morales received a total of 2061 votes, 1020 of which were cast as absentee ballots. His opponent, Rev. Dr. Laurel Hallman, formerly senior minister of the First Unitarian Church of Dallas, TX, received a total of 1481 votes, 827 of which were absentee ballots. Morales' margin of victory was 580 votes.

UUs Advocate for Gulf Coast Civic Works Act

Hundreds of Unitarian Universalist congregations have sent volunteers and raised money for the recovery of the Gulf Coast. Now, the Gulf Coast Civil Works Act has been introduced in Congress, affording UUs a way to connect our service and support with federal advocacy.

The Gulf Coast Civic Works Act would create 100,000 living wage jobs and training opportunities for local and displaced Gulf Coast workers focused on restoring infrastructure and the coastal environment with green building technologies. Advocates believe that, if passed, the Gulf Coast Civic Works Act will empower workers, revitalize the region's workforce, and restore faith in the government's will to respond to the needs of its citizens.
